Bob Dylan: Outlaw Blues by
Spencer Leigh is a fresh take
on this famous yet elusive
personality, a one-man hall of
mirrors who continues to
intrigue his followers
worldwide. It is an in-depth
account with new information
and fascinating opinions, both
from the author and his
interviewees. Whether you are
a Dylan fan or not, you will be

gripped by this remarkable
tale. Most performers create
their work for public approval,
but at the centre of this book is
a mercurial man who doesn't
trust his own audience. If he
feels he is getting too much
acclaim, he tends to veer off in
another direction. Despite his
age, Bob Dylan still tours
extensively. Famously known
for not looking happy, the
author looks at what motivates
him. 'Journalists are very fond
of saying Bob Dylan is an
enigma,' says Spencer Leigh,
'but that word is flawed. It's as
good as saying you don't
know... I have not called Bob
Dylan an enigma at any point in
the book as I have tried to find
answers.' Spencer Leigh has

spoken to over 300 musicians, friends and acquaintances of Bob Dylan in his research for this book. The first biography of Davis, *Say No to the Devil* restores the Rev's remarkable story. Drawing on extensive research and interviews with many of Davis's former students and others who knew him well, music journalist Ian Zack takes readers through Davis's

difficult beginning as the blind son of sharecroppers in the Jim Crow South to his decision to become an ordained Baptist minister and his move to New York in the early 1940s, where he scraped out a living singing and preaching on street corners and in storefront churches in Harlem. There, he gained entry into a circle of musicians that included, among many others, Lead Belly, Woody Guthrie, and Dave Van Ronk. The more you play the guitar the better you'll become and the more fun and enjoyment you'll have. When I asked Rev. Gary Davis when and how I should practice on my guitar his answer was clear. He told me to play first thing in

the morning and then last thing at night. He said I should keep my guitar out of its case so that I could play it whenever I wanted. The message was to play and enjoy yourself. Davis' Holy Blues are presented--gospel songs with a taste of the blues. The online audio recordings teach these arrangements phrase by phrase as well as presenting the original recordings. These lessons are for the intermediate to advanced fingerstyle guitarist. All of the music is in notation and tablature. LESSON ONE: Rev.

Davis played many gospel songs with a blues feel. These are referred to as Holy Blues. Death Don't Have No Mercy is an excellent example of a Holy Blues in the key of Em. Let Us Get Together follows, and is played in the key of G. This is a difficult arrangement illustrating Rev. Davis's control over his right hand. LESSON TWO: Rev. Gary Davis's religious arrangements in the key of C: I Belong to the Band and Tryin' to Get Home. LESSON THREE: For ragtime playing Rev. Davis would approach his guitar as if it were a piano. For gospel songs the guitar takes on the role of a full Baptist church! In this lesson we study two gospel

arrangements, Pure Religion and I Am the Light of the World. Both are played in the key of C and have become popular in today's pop world. Includes access to online audio. Rev.
