Six first through fifth grade educators were identified as participants because their grade levels are departmentalized and teach reading/ELA. This research study addressed three research questions: (a) What do educators

understand about the present instructional approaches to guided reading?, (b) How do educators implement guided reading in their classrooms?, and (c) What are the biggest challenges educators face when implementing guided reading? The three data points utilized in this study included responses to interview questions, evidence from teacher observations, and verification of lesson plan components. The participants were interviewed using opened-ended [sic] interview questions. The participants were also observed using a guided reading observation form, and the participants' lesson plans were examined using a teacher lesson plan checklist.
